Mr. Amani Simpson Under 35 Category | United Kingdom

Mr. Amani Simpson inherited and exemplifies the resilience and determination of the Jamaican people. He is an award-winning creative director, entrepreneur & youth coach, who uses his unique and inspiring story to reach audiences who are often underserved youth. In 2011, Mr. Simpson was stabbed seven times; a near-death experience that changed his life completely and gave rise to his advocacy and renewed sense of faith and spirituality. He produced a short film in 2019 called "Amani", to share this experience which

has since received almost four million views on YouTube, propelling his work as a youth speaker across the United Kingdom. His partnership with the Mayor of London on an anti-crime campaign and his undeniable creativity has made him an influencer. In 2020, he used this leverage to spread hope and encouragement through an online campaign called "Our Lockdown", designed to support young people affected by difficult circumstances, further heightened by the COVID-19 pandemic.

Many speak of Mr. Simpson's humility and his unwavering willingness to reach and guide young people. His story of triumph over adversity is an echo in the bones of those with similar experiences and a guiding light for those most vulnerable.



Bishop Llewellyn Graham

Over 35 Category | United Kingdom

Bishop Llewellyn Graham is a renown religious leader, social entrepreneur, public servant and son of Somerset District in St. Thomas, Jamaica. At the prime of his career, Bishop coordinated a range of social care services to residents of Wolverhampton in the West Midlands, England. His passion and dedicated service are admired by many and well represented through his years of work within the African Caribbean Community in the UK.

As the Executive Director for the Wolverhampton African Caribbean Development Agency, Bishop Graham led advocacy and training sessions while offering development advice to the organisation's membership of black-owned businesses, voluntary organisations and churches. By 1989, Bishop Graham had become the Chief Executive Officer for the Nehemiah United Churches Housing Association - an organisation providing good and affordable housing to members of the African Caribbean Communities in Birmingham, Coventry, Dudley, Sandwell, Walsall and Wolverhampton. Under his leadership, the organisation has raised over £37 million in private financing and in 1997, the organisation received the Gleaner and Jamaica National Group's Honour Award.

During the COVID-19 Pandemic, Bishop Graham led a dedicated team of frontline workers in the delivery of exemplary service to some of the most vulnerable members of the Jamaican-Diaspora Community. With over 35 years of dedicated service to underserved communities and the Jamaican Diaspora, Bishop Llewellyn Graham, has built a strong legacy of quality service above self.



Mr. Dave D'Oyen Under 35 Category | Canada

Mr. Dave D'Oyen, a human rights advocate and youth leader, and son of St. Catherine credits his humble beginnings for shaping who he has become. He has a passion for driving positive systemic change from his home country of Jamaica to Canada where he pursued post-secondary studies at McGill University. Here he was a member of the Joint Board Senate Subcommittee on Race and Ethnic Relations and the Joint Board Senate Subcommittee on Persons with Disabilities.

He is currently a Leading Social Justice Fellow at the University of Toronto. His work in recent years is built on a commitment to advancing change with and for those most in need, evidenced by his volunteering with various institutions and groups such as the Children's Aid Society of Toronto and the Refugee Jobs Agenda Roundtable. Notably, Mr. D'Oyen was a member of Toronto's Police and Community Engagement Review Advisory Committee which was tasked with implementing recommendations to improve the delivery of bias-free policing.

In light of the COVID-19 Pandemic, Mr. D'Oyen organised and hosted a discussion with the first Deputy Medical Officer of Health for the City of Toronto, to engage with the Black community considering that the Black community is disproportionately affected. He is a leader of high integrity and special personal character, and embraces a mindset that is open to growth. These qualities make him a stalwart among his peers and a beacon of inspiration in Jamaica.



Dr. Sylvanus Thompson

Over 35 Category | Canada

Dr. Sylvanus Thompson is a Fellow of the Canadian Health Service Research Foundation and prolific public health expert who has made evidence-based approaches a central theme of his career. He was educated at the West Indies School of Public Health in Jamaica in 1976, and later the Ryerson University, the University of Guelph and the University of Berkley, where he completed his Doctor of Philosophy in Public Health Administration in 2004.

He is now the Chief Executive Officer of Dr. T Food Safety Consulting Services; and continues to serve the lamaican community in Canada as an active member of the Jamaican Canadian Association. Adept at implementation science and research, Dr. Thompson has played a leading role in the design and rollout of several programs across the world that focus on overall public health, food safety and quality assurance practices. Even after moving to Canada, he remained committed to building the resilience of the public health response in Jamaica. He played a pivotal role in mobilising resources and technical assistance in Jamaica's fight against the Chikungunya virus, Zika virus and hand foot and mouth disease outbreaks. More recently, Dr. Thompson was actively involved in several COVID-19 related research studies and outreach programs that provided tailored support to Canadian-Jamaicans and broader cohorts of African Canadians who are disproportionately affected by the pandemic. Through his efforts, infrared thermometers were donated to the Ministry of Health for routine monitoring of passengers on arrival at the major airports in Jamaica.



Ms. Cassandra Campbell

Under 35 Category | United States of America

Miss Cassandra Campbell demonstrates what her peers describe as an unfounded enthusiasm to support initiatives that invariably lead her back to her roots in Jamaica. In the different spaces she imbues, she displays unbelievable passion in supporting Jamaica and by extension the Caribbean, through leveraging the resources available to her via renown partners in the United States such as Facebook, where she is now a Program Manager.

Miss Campbell is a proud graduate of Virginia State University and boasts both a Master's and Bachelor's degree in Economics. Her intellect, creativity and impeccable professionalism have afforded her an extensive track record in branding and campaign management, which also saw her working in the prestigious White House during President Obama's tenure.

In the midst of the COVID-19 pandemic, during Summer 2020, Miss Campbell led Facebook's first Messenger Bootcamp and Hackathon, and advocated for the company's ongoing Online Hackathons series to be sponsored in Jamaica and the Caribbean. Her desire to improve the region's economic outcomes has helped Computer Science students in Kingston, giving them greater exposure to Facebook's technology, programming, and resources. Additionally, she has worked intimately in bringing to life several projects including a technology bootcamp for Jamaican university students, a marketing webinar for Jamaican-owned small businesses in Atlanta coupled with the unrelenting support she gave to the technology start-up ecosystem in Jamaica.



Dr. Trudy Hall

Over 35 Category | United States of America

Dr. Trudy Hall is a clinician who embodies a love for humanity, mirrored in the care she affords to the patients she meets in her medical practice. With over 20 years experience, Dr. hall bodes a track record of impeccable service to healthcare in the United States, where she dons many leadership roles and medical directorships. She has an affinity for public health promotion and thrust for policy development, affording her a platform to address disparities in healthcare.

In 1991, she was conferred Doctor of Medicine from the Robert Wood Johnson Medical School at the University of Medicine and Dentistry of New Jersey. Since then she has provided service to her community in her demanding and coveted roles as Chief Resident in Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation at the JFK Johnson Rehabilitation Institute in Edison, New Jersey, Commissioner on the Health Services and Cost Review Commission, President of Maryland State National Medical Association, Vice President of Medical Affairs and Interim President for UM Laurel Regional Hospital as well as Chief Medical Officer for University of Maryland Medical System's Chronic Care and Rehabilitation hospital.

Recently, in response to the surge of cases arising from the Covid-19 pandemic, Dr. Hall became responsible for the 145-Bed Covid Alternative Care Site, for the state of Maryland, where she also caters to the behavioral health needs of Covid positive patients. This has positioned her as a well sought out speaker for mentorship programs, numerous health care topics and Covid-19 pandemic education.
